Sense in the Face of Nonsense:

How a Search for Meaning Underlies Many Key Psychological Motivations

The meaning maintenance model proposes that people have a need for meaning; that is, a need to perceive the world through mental representations of expected relations. When people encounter anomalies that are inconsistent with their schemas they may affirm or abstract alternative schemas as a way to regain meaning – even if those schemas are from domains entirely different from the original meaning threat. This model provides a common account for people's reactions to self-esteem threats, feelings of uncertainty, cognitive dissonance, perceptions of an unjust world, and mortality salience. I will discuss the findings from more than a dozen experiments that show the diverse compensatory responses that people have to a broad range of meaning threats, and the conditions under which these reactions emerge.
